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### THE HELMUT ESAU AWARD

Our congratulations go to Thomas Lewis, this year's Esau Award winner, for his paper titled "Restricted identities: Latinx threat discourses and Anglo public space in New Orleans, LA". Well done, Tom! LASSO is very proud of all of our student members and encourages them to not only present their research at our annual meeting, but to also participate in the contest for the Esau Award. To be eligible for the Helmut Esau Award, students must first present at the Annual Meeting and then submit a revised version of their paper to the LASSO Vice President/President Elect, Rey Romero. The award is given to the best of all high-quality submissions received. Recipients of this prestigious award receive a \$400 cash prize. Students who have their abstracts accepted for the meeting in Baton Rouge should plan now to enter the Esau competition. To be considered for the 2020 Esau Award, polished, article-length manuscripts should be sent to Rey Romero at [romerore@uhd.edu](mailto:romerore@uhd.edu) following our fall meeting and must be in his hands by **March 31, 2020**. This award is named in honor of Helmut Esau, who was active in the early days of LASSO. Professor Esau died in an automobile accident shortly after he was elected to the LASSO presidency, and his colleagues at the time established the Esau Award to commemorate his contributions to the Linguistic Association of the Southwest and to the profession at large.

#### **EDITORIAL SCOPE**

The journal publishes papers across a broad range of topics in linguistics, though research papers dealing with the languages of the southwestern United States and northern Mexico are especially encouraged. The journal also publishes scholarly reviews of the literature, book reviews, and occasional commentary on topics of concern to the journal's readership. Proposals for thematic issues and nominations for guest editors are invited.

#### **BOOK REVIEWS**
